Over the course of hundreds of screenings, the fight to save La Clef grew into a large movement that brought together audiences of thousands and artists including Jean-Luc Godard, Martin Scorsese, John Carpenter, Céline Sciamma and David Lynch, among many others.


With their help, donations, and after five years of hard work and countless twists and turns, our collective successfully gathered the funds needed to buy the movie theater and keep it from disappearing.
